Focus on..... SSAFA

In the next in our series of taking a closer look at One Place we are focusing on SSAFA, the Armed Forces Charity. Founded in 1885 to support the wives and children left behind when men went to war and those who returned from fighting overseas, today SSAFA supports all who have served 1 day or more or are currently serving in the British Armed Forces, and their dependent families. SSAFA operates in 10 countries including the UK and in 2016 helped 67,616 people through their charitable services, including 38,978 cases and visits to beneficiaries.

Many of our elderly patients will have undertaken National Service and may not realise they qualify for support from SSAFA, plus of course all those who have served more recently. Help can be in many forms including needs for white goods, furniture, furnishings, disabled equipment, top ups for care costs, moving home, relocation costs, bereavement counselling, or just a friendly visit. Also for serving personnel respite care for special needs children, adoption services to give just a few examples.

For financial assistance the client's household income will be means tested. For Veterans or their eligible dependents a Caseworker visits the client, verifies their service details, finds out their needs, records all their finances and applies to the relevant Benevolent fund, in some cases more than one. Once funds have been granted the goods can be ordered. For some non-financial needs, including debt advice, the client will be signposted to a relevant organisation.

All SSAFA caseworkers are trained volunteers, supported by professionals at SSAFA Central Office, dedicated to helping their clients.

At Addenbrooke's either Lesley , a caseworker for many years and now

responsible fundraising and publicity, or Daphne, Secretary and Caseworker are in the One Place Office every Tuesday form 10.00 until 16.00. It is clear both of them are passionate about their volunteer work for SSAFA, enjoying the broad cross-section of people and the incredible difference the support given can make.

Daphne explained the range of help available is broad, from arranging a house clearance to supporting those with post-traumatic stress disorder, an issue which is on the rise. She went on to say that overall cases are getting more complex and the variety of uses increasing.

"One day's pay is all you need"

The SSAFA team's aim is for nobody to leave the hospital, including dependents, not being aware of how SSAFA is able to help. So if anyone is, or knows service personnel, their family or a veteran who has a military background and needs help or advice, please signpost to One Place.

In August 15 young people on the National Citizen's Service (NCS) came to Addenbrookes to help us come up with ideas for ward activity boxes.

NCS was founded in 2009 with the vision that young people can change the world around them if given the right tools, opportunities and respect. It is a national scheme whereby 15-17 year olds live together, working together over the summer break, on projects to help support their local community. By doing so, not only do they make new friends but also develop life skills such as budgeting, leadership and build their confidence,

On their first visit, the group were briefed about the project by Maggie and Rose, a Ward Volunteer. They got to see first-hand the layout of a bed space when they visited the mock ward training room and had the opportunity to ask questions about the hospital, patients, dementia etc.

Split into 3 teams, the group spent a week carrying out research to come up with appropriate items to go into the activity boxes. They needed to consider the target patients, for instance general adults (box I) and those with dementia (box 2); the logistics of using any activities around the bed space, size of the box, as well as the budget set.

On their return to Addenbrooke's the teams presented their ideas to a panel made up of staff and Library volunteer Maureen, who assessed the boxes.

All the participating students were awarded a certificate as thanks for participating in such a dymanic, community oriented project Maggie; " it was wonderful to be part

of such an inspiring project and to see the energy and enthusiasm of all the young people. Thanks to all those who helped to make this possible."
