Focus on.... MacMillan





John Wortley, Macmillan Cancer Information Support Specialist

There are a few new faces in the Macmillan team so this month we meet John Wortley, the new Macmillan Cancer Information Support Specialist who tells us all the exciting news and plans for Macmillan.

Having joined the NHS in February, it's been a busy few months for John but speaking to him it is clear he is really passionate about the role. With a background in health and fitness, latterly focusing on cardiac rehabilitation as well as public health, joining the Macmillan team at CUH has been a real fresh start for him. What's even better is that the role is everything he wanted it to be with no 2 days being the same.

So what has he been working on so far?

The role is certainly varied with John giving input into the redesign of the external and internal website pages, with the aim of showcasing the CUH cancer services at their best as well as of course ensuring they provide relevant information in an easily accessible way. He is also involved in health and wellbeing such as Living with and Beyond Cancer which focus on issues including exercise, diet, fatigue – things that are not directly related to treatment but of course impact on a person's overall wellbeing.

Volunteers are brilliant!

Coordinating the Macmillan pod, John ensures the right information is available to those who need it – whether through ensuring sufficient supply of relevant leaflets to coordinating the volunteers.

Other projects include piloting of a 'Mini Macmillan Pod' on Ward D9 on Wednesday from 12.30-14.00. Although early days, so far this has been successful as it enables patients to more easily access information without having to traipse down to the main Macmillan pod, quite a distance from the ward, particularly when feeling very unwell. Hopefully the pilot will prove successful and will be rolled out to other wards where there are patients with cancer.

An exciting development being coordinated by John's colleague Jenny

are the four Macmillan Navigators. Focussing on a particular group of cancers – colorectal, prostate, haematology and breast cancer, they use the Macmillan electronic Holistic Needs Assessment tool (eHNA) to support enable appropriate support for patients. On a tablet device, the eHNA tool enables patients to 'voice' their concerns regarding living with cancer that they may not be able to do in a face to face conversation.

Going forward

"It's a new start and I genuinely believe I can make a significant difference to oncology patients here and in the wider community with their health wellbeing. As more people are diagnosed with and survive cancer, getting the appropriate support has never been more needed."

What about the volunteers?

John is of course also responsible for the local management of the volunteers in and around the Macmillan pod. So what did he say? "Volunteers are brilliant! They come from so many different backgrounds and when I see someone talk to a volunteer who has been through a similar experience, the patient visibly relaxes. All the volunteers are very welcoming and relaxed and the patients feel able to pop in for a chat, I think they're an invaluable resource, I really do."

Guest slot.... Gerry, Chaplaincy and Guide volunteer



In this month's ADviser, we continue our series hearing how our volunteers spend their time when not at CUH. Gerry, who volunteers in the Chaplaincy and as a Guide explains his role with the Ladybird Trust.

When I'm not guiding patients from the main entrance or pushing wheel chairs down to the chapel for Sunday services at Addenbrookes I take it relatively easy doing my other volunteering job as a crew-member on the 23 tonne, iron "Ladybird", a wide narrowboat! She is wheelchair accessible and accommodates up to 20 passengers in a large heated cabin complete with kitchen and toilet facilities. Only the crew need get wet and cold! The open foredeck area enables passengers to enjoy to the full the magnificent scenery and wildlife on the river.

The Ladybird was originally provided 12 years ago by the generosity of Sir John and Lady Baird and initially run by St John Ambulance Brigade of which I used to be a member. Four years ago though St John withdrew from the running and this was taken over by the Ladybird Charitable Trust (ladybirdboat.org.uk) which comprises mainly crew-members. The considerable running costs are met by donations from passengers (no charge is made for trips), patrons and many fundraising activities.

Our trippers are mainly, but not always, in groups, often with special physical or mental needs and the elderly, though some of the crew are older than the latter! We go out most weekdays from early spring to late summer. A typical trip is between 10am and 3pm, and, from Hartford Marina, is either upstream towards Godmanchester and Brampton, or down to the Hemingfords and St lves. Lunch is up to the organisers of course and can be a picnic on or off the boat or perhaps fish and chips which can be brought to the mooring at Godmanchester or St lves. Winter is given over to crew training, all of whom are unpaid volunteers. Except for the "Boatmaster" role which has it's own extensive training and examination requirements we're trained to do all the jobs on the boat including taking it in turns to operate the locks, throw ropes for mooring, take the helm, liaise with the passengers, make tea and act as look -out. Indeed in addition to looking out for other boats to avoid I lookout for the many birds on the river to photograph! A couple of snaps taken from the boat are shown.

The River Great Ouse is one of the most attractive parts of our county, especially when you're on it. It hardly seems like voluntary work!


Outpatients car park work
