enable attendees to gain knowledge and understanding about research, diseases, and conditions from expert guest speakers and are becoming increasingly popular.

Perhaps the biggest responsibility of the department is to support the eight patient governors, seven public governors and four staff governors to fulfil their remit of representing their constituents, namely the general public, patients and staff of the CUH and holding non-executive board to account. There are also nine governors appointed by external organisations such as the University or City Council who are supported by the Membership Office. With a membership of 20,000, it is not always easy to build the link, hence the Membership Strategy is going to be refreshed and relaunched during 2020. The aim is to ensure that the membership is representative of the communities served by the Trust.

Governor Elections on the horizon

This year six governor posts are up for election, three patient, two public and one staff. As with members of staff, volunteers are only eligible to be staff members and therefore be nominated as a staff governors candidate, even if like many of us, they are also patients and/or eligible for public membership. As many will already be aware, Bill Davidson, Macmillan volunteer, is one of the four staff governors having been elected in 2019 for a three year term. What is a 'family carer' and how does CUH support carers?


Caring often begins at home but many people never think of themselves as carers: they are partners, spouses, children, relatives and friends.
