
This annual event is held at various ports across Europe where the majority of ships are crewed by professionals with volunteers who work and pay for their own passage. Sixty ships had been confirmed to attend setting sail from Kristiansand in Norway so we were anticipating a magnificent sea of masts and sails on the dockside.

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I had managed to secure tickets in advance for a cruise on a Dutch Tall Ship named "Wylde Swan". Once on-board, slowly under engine we edged out from the dockside into Hartlepool Bay, where the sails were hoisted and engine turned off. All we could hear were the waves gently lapping against the hull of the ship as we cut through the water. Lunch was included and by the time we had returned to the dock it was late afternoon. We felt this had been a once in a lifetime trip so it was with great excitement that soon after we disembarked "Wylde Swan", we spotted an advert alongside another Tall Ship called "Astrid" offering an evening boat trip the following day. Needless to say, we grabbed 2 tickets!

open water surrounded by other Tall Ships all waiting for the fireworks to begin at 9.45pm. What a magical evening on-board "Astrid", one I will always remember! But sad to say, that in 2013 Astrid was travelling to Ireland and after her engine failed, she was blown onto rocks and sank. A truly sad end to such a magnificent Tall Ship.

#### **Staff Governor Elections 2021**

As a volunteer, you are automatically a staff member of CUH's Foundation Trust membership body and entitled to stand for election and vote in the upcoming Council of Governor elections for the staff constituency.

This spring there will be three Staff Governor vacancies arising: two with three-year terms of office and one with a two-year term. The elections will be run by Civica Election Service (CES), our independent electoral scrutineers, who will be providing nomination forms and official guidance from Tuesday 16 March 2021.

The voting process will begin from Friday 7 May, where CES will begin distributing ballot papers to your email or home address (if you are not on email). Please be assured that your data is secure and is being passed to our independent election administrators under the strictest of information governance rules in order that they may send you your ballot papers. #### St Lucia



Saint Lucia is an Eastern Caribbean island nation with a pair of dramatically tapered mountains, the Pitons, on its west coast. Its coast is home to volcanic beaches, reef-diving sites, luxury resorts and fishing villages.

The local climate is tropical, specifically a tropical rainforest climate.

The island is a volcanic island and is more mountainous than most Caribbean islands, with the highest point being Mount Gimie, at 950 metres above sea level. Two other mountains, the Pitons, form the island's most famous landmark.
