CUH Arts: Hot off the LetterPress

We are so proud to reveal that poetry by four of our talented **Beyond the Mask** contributors is featuring in not one but TWO exhibitions this summer!

Sculptor Rae Stevens took inspiration from the powerful words of CUH staff Sukhpreet Singh Dubb, Penny Fisher, Jo Franklin and Joanna Rowley for her latest piece (pictured below). Accompanying the sculpture is a limited edition run of beautiful letterpress prints that are available to buy.

Rae trained as a nurse at Addenbrooke's in the 1980's and worked for 30 years as a clinician and manager until retraining as a professional artist. Our Beyond the Mask poetry collection sparked memories from her time working as an Infectious Diseases unit during the Aids epidemic.

Keeping us all safe

As a hospital we all have a duty to our volunteers, staff and patients to do what we can to minimise the spread of Covid. With national guidance relaxing we have seen a lapse in the strict measures we are taking within the hospital, which puts our vulnerable patients and our staff at greater risk.

We will always take a more cautious approach than the wider population to the easing of restrictions. We have an important role to play in fighting this virus – we must do all we can to avoid putting ourselves at risk and we must protect our patients. This means that all of our Covid secure measures remain in place and did not change when government guidance changed in July. We will review our position again in a few weeks.

Please continue to follow COVID secure environment guidance and remember:

- Facemasks must be worn at all times (with the exception of eating or drinking)
- Maintain a 2-metre distance
- Social distancing must be maintained in staff rooms and during breaks
- No social gatherings in the workplace
- Visiting continues to be restricted and we are asking patients to attend appointments alone
- The Food Court remains a staff only area.



Roger's steam train adventure

I must tell you of a trip we made a couple of weeks ago.

The Christmas before last, i.e. 2019, my son gave us a Virgin Experience voucher as a Christmas present. It was for a journey on the Grand Central Railway, and an afternoon tea. The Grand Central Railway runs from Loughborough to Leicester, and we had the choice of two stations to have the afternoon tea. We chose the Butler Henderson Cafe at Quorn station. Quorn station is one stop from Loughborough.

The platform at Quorn station is full of memorabilia of the second world war. The decor, the Waiting Room for Ladies and Waiting Room for Gentleman, the uniform of the staff, the Stationmaster, porters, Booking office for tickets using an old ticket printing machine. On the platform was an old pram painted Battleship Grey, with painted on the side the words "Up you Adolf" In the station yard there is a car park and several old steam engines, some of which were being worked on by enthusiasts.

There was a choice of Diesel or Steam trains to travel on, we chose a steam train. The carriages have been renovated and are clean and comfortable. You can hop on and off at any of the four or five stations between Loughborough and Leicester. At Leicester the engine is turned around on a turntable for the return to Loughborough.



On the journey back we got on the train in carriages which were at the back of the train, and when we reached Quorn, unbeknown to us the train was longer than the

platform. When I opened the door to get out, I stepped on the step of the carriage and suddenly realized we were over the slope of the platform and not over the flat part. But with the momentum of stepping on to the step, I could not stop myself and in an undignified way fell out of the carriage. Fortunately I didn't hurt myself, only grazing my hand when I put it down to break the fall and landed on my backside. My pride was hurt more.

I had to fill in an accident form with the Stationmaster, who told me normally when they have a long train, they have someone at the front of the train on the platform, someone in the middle, and someone at the back of to make sure everyone gets off safely, but that day they were short staffed. So if anyone is going on that trip, make sure you get in a carriage in the middle of the train.

By the way, we did enjoy the tea!
