
CUH Arts: Quentin Blake: The Drawing of my Life

Asymptomatic Testing

Just a reminder to all those who have returned to volunteering that CUH that both staff and volunteers are encouraged to undertake fortnightly asymptomatic PCR tests. The test collection point is now located in the corridor between G2 and J2 from 08.30-16.30 and you will need to show your ID badge.

The test drop-off point is in a red wheelie bin (clearly labelled) in the left hand end of the covid testing area by S block

Although not absolutely essential, it is a good idea to be signed-up to MyChart to access your results.
