#### Keeping busy over lockdown.... John, Volunteer Guide

It was forty years ago that John Phelps, a volunteer guide, came up with the idea of his latest novel. "What would happen if power was turned upside down, with big animals becoming weak and small ones strong?" he wondered.

The idea did not linger for long then, as there were more pressing matters to think about ... such as attending to a young family and working as a journalist as the "Cambridge Evening News." Since he retired eighteen years ago, he stayed busy and, among other things, wrote two novels and began to embark on a third. "Then, all of a sudden, that idea of forty years ago resurfaced and I had a burning desire to follow it up," he said.

So, just before the onset of COVID, he got to work on his new novel which could be described as "a futuristic fantasy with a hint of what could happen to the world if we are not careful." When COVID came along, there was no excuse. "I would not, by any stretch, call it a blessing in disguise, but it did give me more time".

The book is now in print, and a fourth novel, a whodunnit with a seaside newspaper office as a backdrop, is now finished as well. If you'd like to know more, John's books available from Waterstones and WH Smith.

However, he has not let writing or COVID stop him from pursuing other interests completely.

"I like to play bridge, mostly on-line now, twice a week and meet friends for an occasional drink," he said. "Exercise is important, too, and I make a point of having a walk, cycle ride or swim every day. I also do a few exercises at home."


