The war in Ukraine: a message to CUH staff and volunteers

We are deeply impacted by the traumatic scenes we are witnessing in Ukraine as a result of the Russian invasion. The suffering of the Ukrainian people, many of whom are now fleeing their homes to become refugees, is a rapidly unfolding tragedy of huge proportion.

The human cost of the current violence stands in such stark contrast to the intensity of the effort we've made in this hospital over the last two years to preserve life in the life of a global pandemic. A number of the outstanding colleagues who have cared so successfully for our patients during this period are from Ukraine, Russia and other eastern European countries now caught up in the consequences of this conflict.

We wish to express our solidarity, our support and our deepest sympathy for anyone affected personally by what is happening. The fighting between two countries bears no relation to the united team of people who make up CUH. Please take time to look after yourselves and each other at this time and be aware that a situation like this affects us all in different ways.

Healthcare is of course on our minds and colleagues who are in touch with team in hospitals in Ukraine are offering advice and support where they can. Some of us are supporting the Disasters Emergency Committee, or other humanitarian aid charities.

While we rarely comment on global events, we feel that this situation demands a difference response. On Wednesday evening, the Addenbrooke's chimney was lit in the colours of the Ukrainian flag for one week as an expression of our support for its people and everyone caught up in this conflict. As we respond to this situation, we also recognise that there is violence, conflict and loss of life in other parts of the world that also affects our staff, but is not currently making headlines.

This is our opportunity to make it quite clear that here at Addenbrook's and the Rosie hospitals we stand together for peace, and with the deepest respect for the value of every human life, everywhere in the world.

CUH Arts: Project Callouts

Kintsugi People

We are seeking volunteers (any member of CUH or the public) to be photographed for an exciting new photographic exhibition in The Addenbrooke's Gallery called *Kintsugi People*. The project has been developed by Carol Holliday, a lecturer of psychotherapy at Cambridge University with 20 years' experience of clinical practice, in collaboration with photographer Ryan Davies.

Kintsugi is a Japanese art form where broken ceramics are mended using gold, thus rendering the ceramic more valuable by virtue of the fact that it was broken. The exhibition will show 8-12 large-scale black and white images of people with visible scars on their body, and the scars will be painted over with gold leaf, to highlight the scar – see example image. Carol wants these images to be hopeful and celebratory of bodies that have needed 'repair', to show how we can heal and live well after traumatic events.

We are looking for volunteers who have scars from surgery or accidents and are over the age of 18. Anyone interested in being photographed will have a discussion with Carol and be invited to a photography session in Cambridge. Dates for the sessions are: 26th, 27th, 28th March or 9th, 10th April (there is flexibility in these dates). Sessions would take no longer than 2 hours.



As the days are getting longer and our coats slightly thinner, our January YPP Programme is now sadly coming to an end and we are now beginning preparations for our next cohort.

Our young person's programme has again been run as a virtual experience, meaning the ward participation part has not taken place. Travel update: M11 junction 9 to 10 bridge repairs

Highways England has notified us of essential maintenance work on the junction 9 bridge on the M11 which will result in a closure of the M11 between junctions 9 and 10 in both directions, over four weekends from Friday 11 March to 04 April.
