This week, CUH Arts attended the Senses and Health/Care Environments Conference, spotlighting the work of our Dance for Health programme. Our session included practical music and movement activity, held by Dance for Health's lead artist Filipa Pereira-Stubbs, to enable delegates to experience the programme from a patient's perspective. The conference was funded by the Welcome Trust and held by Sensing Spaces of Healthcare.

We also released the second of the Dance for Health films, this time focusing on using gentle movement to help shift anxiety. Anxiety and worry are common experiences in everyday life, but particularly so when experiencing health

Covid-19 vaccinations

Vaccination as a condition of deployment

You may be aware that, following consultation, the Government has revoked legislation to make Covid vaccination a condition of deployment for health and social care staff. We still believe vaccination is the right thing to do for our staff to protect themselves, their families and our patients and we welcome this decision and support the rights of our staff to make individual decisions about their vaccination status.

Accessing Covid-19 vaccinations

The Covid vaccination centre at the Deakin Centre closed in January, but you can book Covid-19 vaccinations (1st, 2nd, 3rd and booster doses) via the **National Booking Service** and the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough CCG regularly update the list of drop-in clinic locations on their **vaccinators on tour website**.

As you may have seen, the Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI) has advised that an additional Covid-19 booster jab should be offered to people aged 75 years and over, residents in care homes for older adults, and people aged 12 years and over who are immunosuppressed from this Spring. If this is applicable to you, please do take up the invitation. This latest guidance does not include all healthcare workers. We will update you on any additional booster vaccinations for healthcare workers/volunteers as and when we receive further guidance.

Lateral flow tests

We know many volunteers are concerned about access to lateral flow tests now they are no longer free for the general population. We are awaiting further guidance on what this means for healthcare staff and volunteers and will update you as soon as possible.

In the meantime we would encourage you to try and access these via the **national online system** or via local collection points such as pharmacies and community venues.

We encourage all volunteers who have returned to taken up the free PCR asymptomatic testing programme. Please let us know if you are unsure of how to access this.

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A trip to Belgrade.... Arthur, Ward

On the 21st March I travelled to Belgrade to support the British Athletics team at the World Indoor Athletics championship. An Air Serbia flight from Heathrow went without hitch and I joined a group of 17 like-minded supporters with one day to sightsee before the competition commenced. Belgrade is not the prettiest or the most interesting of capital cities and I guess not too many of you would have visited but we did enjoy a walking tour around the city. I have shown a couple of photos from our walk and probably the best view in town of the riverfront, from the Sava flowing to join the Danube on the edge of the city.

The fabric of Belgrade is very much shaped by its chequered history, which in the late Middle Ages frequently changing from being part of the Ottoman empire to the House of Hapsburg. Then in World War II the city was heavily bombed by the Luftwaffe and finally by the Allies.

Following the fall of Communism and the break up of the former Yugoslavia, Belgrade was once again bombed this time by NATO at the time of the Kosovo war. Not surprising then that the city does show signs of wear in places.

Now, following the 2000 presidential elections, belated new development has slowly begun to take place, especially along the waterfront and in years to come it will hopefully attract many more visitors to boost its economy. The people were very friendly towards us and enjoyable evenings were spent taking in local colour.

As for the sport it was a wonderful event, although not from a British perspective! The star performances for me were a world record for Mondo Duplantis of Sweden in the pole vault, 6.20m which was the very last activity in the stadium on the final night; Yulima Rojas from Venezuela again breaking the world record in the women's triple jump with 15.74m, the home crowds favourite Ivana Vuleta with a winning 7.06m in the women's long jump and a special mention to the ladies high jump winner Yareoslava Mahuchikh from the Ukraine who travelled by car from her home in Ukraine to compete! This to great applause from the majority of the audience. I must also mention the Italian High jumper Gianmarco Tamberi, see photo, a great character who entertained the crowd and wore

on his shoulder a representation of the Ukraine flag and the names of two competitors who were trapped in that country – well done to him.

After a few drinks to celebrate a great trip, we headed home the following day with Wizz Air to Luton and time to look forward to the World outdoor championships in Oregon in July!
