




Some familiar faces to help spread the word...


Say hello to our new YPP volunteers!

All Gender Toilets

Some existing public use, single cubicle toilets across CUH have been modified to create toilets available for all genders. They include a toilet, wash hand basin, and sanitary bin. Female, male, and accessible toilets are also still available.

All gender toilets offer choice – for example parents with children, people with carers – and they are inclusive, providing the opportunity for people to make choices about which toilet they may need or prefer to use based on their individual requirements. Facilities for men or women only have also been retained, as we know, from talking to different staff and patient groups, it is important to be able to offer a choice.

The all gender facilities can be found in: C&D block, A block, The Rosie Hospital, the management bridge. Many of these facilities were mixed use prior to modification. Locations in the Addenbrooke's Treatment Centre (ATC) have been identified for future modification.
