We're also delighted to be joined by a new team of supervisors who will be utilizing the expertise they gained as YPP volunteers themselves to support this new cohort on the wards for the duration of the programme. Happy 75th Birthday NHS

The queue stretched back to the road between ATC and Royal Papworth, but moved along swiftly and within 10 mins we were allocated to one of 4 entry queues, given a personal menu card to tick off our choices and the rest is history as shown in the pictures."



Update on mask wearing

We have been notified that following close monitoring of the spread of viruses in our hospitals, as well as ensuring the following of the latest national guidance and practice on the measures being taken to help protect our staff, volunteers and patients.

With immediate effect:

- Staff and volunteers who work in the hospital in non-clinical and clinical areas (this includes high risk areas) are no longer required to wear surgical masks for normal duties
- Surgical masks will continue to be provided at entrances to clinical areas for staff and visitors who wish to continue to use them

If you have had a respiratory illness and are returning to work with residual symptoms are recommended to wear a surgical until these symptoms have resolved



Hand hygiene reminder

Please always ensure you are:

- Bare below the elbow in clinical areas
- Hand hygiene must be performed before entering or leaving a clinical area
- Use liquid soap and water when hands visibly soiled or if there are infections on the ward

Music for Addenbrooke's.... Simon, Ward Volunteer

In 2020, at the start of the Covid 19 pandemic, Professor Peter Johnstone of St John's College was treated in Addenbrooke's for nearly 6 months, part of which he spent in Intensive Care. When he finally left, he was handed the ICU diaries which his nurses had kept to record his time in a coma as he battled Covid. Peter Johnstone is a choral singer and reading these diaries he realized that they could be set to music as a record of his treatment by dedicated staff who had saved his life but whom he had never even consciously met.

Fast forward to 20 July 2023, and this essentially Cambridge story has been brought to life in a marvelous piece of music by Richard Blackford, performed by the Bach Choir, the Britten Sinfonia and with the contribution of the Addenbrookes' Singers, under conductor David Hill. It was magnificently performed in Cambridge's most awe-inspiring setting, King's College Chapel.

The music, 'Vision of a Garden' by Richard Blackford, beautifully voices Peter Johnstone's thoughts and feelings as he comes to terms with Covid, together with the voices of the nursing staff who cared for him, sung with great intimacy by the Chorus. The piece opens with the nurses speaking to the comatose Peter Johnstone: 'Hi Peter, I'm Evie, one of the critical care nurses. My name is Alvin, looking after you tonight'. The music is a marvelous modern vehicle for counterposing Peter's initially confused perceptions and feelings with the reassuring voices of his carers, as he becomes increasingly aware of why he is in hospital and what has made him ill. In the course of it, he remembers what at first seems to have been a dream



of visiting a garden, which finally proves to have been a real event when he was pushed in a wheelchair down to enjoy the fresh air in Addenbrooke's garden. The music works on both the quiet intimate level of Peters' thoughts, but also reaches a tornado of sound when he is told what has caused his illness: 'the Covid 19 virus, the plague that is sweeping the world'.

The concert also featured other wonderful pieces. A 'Hymn' by Thomas Tallis, the great English Renaissance composer; Vaughan William's 'Fantasia on a Theme by Tallis'; Christopher Wood's 'Aberfan', a moving reflection on the 1966 mining disaster which wiped out a village's school children; and Maurice Duruflé's 'Requiem' which reaches a great crescendo (magnified by King's College's amazing acoustic) before ending quietly.

It is fitting that Addenbrooke's epic efforts to treat and stem the pandemic are recognized, while remembering the great cost in lives and its toll on NHS staff and morale.

Thanks are due to Ben Johnson and the Cambridge Summer Music team, David Hill, the conductor, and Natalie Hill of CUH Arts, for bringing the music to Cambridge, its natural home. (It was premiered in 2021 at the Royal Festival Hall in London).
