



CUH commits to the NHS Sexual Safety Charter

CUH has signed the Sexual Safety Charter, launched by NHS England with the aim of ensuring a systematic, zero-tolerance approach to sexual misconduct and violence in the NHS.

By signing this charter, we are committing to taking and enforcing a zero-tolerance approach to any inappropriate and harmful sexual behaviours towards our workforce.

There are 10 core principles and actions to help achieve our commitment, that we will implement by July 2024. The principles are:

- We will actively work to eradicate sexual harassment and abuse in the workplace
- We will promote a culture that fosters openness and transparency, and does not tolerate unwanted, harmful and/or inappropriate sexual behaviours
- We will take an intersectional approach to the sexual safely of our workforce, recognising certain groups will experience sexual harassment and abuse at a disproportionate rate
- We will provide appropriate support for those in our workplace who experience unwanted, inappropriate, and/or harmful sexual behaviour
- We will ensure appropriate, specific, and clear policies are in place. They will include appropriate and timely action against alleged perpetrators
- We will ensure appropriate, specific, and clear training is in place
- We will ensure appropriate reporting mechanisms are in place for those experiencing these behaviours

As part of this commitment, and to guide our implementation of the Sexual Safety Charter at CUH, a series of listening sessions focused on sexual safety will be held in April - further information on these sessions will be shared shortly.

Annesley Donald, deputy director of workforce and our named sexual safety lead said "We want CUH to

be a place where everyone feels safe to come to work. In signing the Sexual Safety Charter we are committing to a series of actions that will help create a culture at CUH where inappropriate and harmful sexual behaviours are never accepted, where victims and witnesses feel confident and empowered to report incidents, and where appropriate and timely action is taken against perpetrators.

Cambridge Children's Hospital

Work has started on the Cambridge Children's Hospital site to prepare the area for construction which is due to begin in 2025.

R G Carter has been appointed to deliver this work, which includes connecting services to the site, creating access point and excavating the land to prepare for archaeological works.



A number of trees also need to be felled around the boundary of the site, which is on the corner of Dame Mary Archer Way and Robinson Way; these will be replaced as part of the hospital build.

The project was given planning permission in March 2022, with the condition that meaningful work must begin within two years. In October, the Outline Business Case for the hospital was approved in principle and the project will tender for a construction partner for the hospital later this year.
